Meeting Minutes—January 19, 2008—Richard's Restaurant

Commander Matt Elkin presided and opened the meeting at 1:00 p.m. Chaplain Jacob Elkin led the group in the opening prayer, and members joined to recite the American's Creed and the Pledge of Allegiance. Secretary Gayle Eikenberry reported that minutes of the December meeting had been sent to members and asked for corrections. Allen Moore moved that the minutes be accepted, Jon Ayres seconded, and the motion passed. Treasurer Randy McNally gave our account balance as \$2,639.82, of which \$398.37 remains in the Cannon Fund. A motion to accept the report was made by Russ Kirchner, seconded by Alan Teller, and passed. Treasurer McNally then read a letter from the Howard County Veterans Council stating that the restoration work on the monument in Crown Point Cemetery had been finished with funds left over. The Council gave us a check for \$300 to use without restrictions. It was noted that this was very generous since the Council also let us keep the proceeds from the sale of the replica monuments and the prints. Commander Elkin will send a thank you note to the Council.

Members present were: Matt Elkin, Jacob Elkin, Allen Moore, Tom Crawford, Randy McNally, Alan Teller, Russ Kirchner, Jon Ayers, Todd Dwigans, and Gayle Eikenberry. Lee Ann Teller and Cella Kirchner attended as our guests.

Commander Elkin explained that our camp charter was to be draped for thirty days by order of our Department Commander due to the passing of a long-time member of the Ben Harrison Camp in Indianapolis.

Old Business:

Commander Elkin asked for volunteers to clean the cannon, stating that he would clean it in February. Alan Teller volunteered for March and Russ Kirchner for April.

Commander Elkin requested an update on plans for honoring Carroll County's last surviving Union soldier. Tom Crawford said that he had been working on the wording of the plaque and still wanted to find out if Beck had belonged to a chapter of the G.A.R. The proposed wording of the plaque is given below. Suggestions are welcome.

George W. Beck was the last surviving Union soldier from Carroll County. May we always remember and honor all of Carroll's Union veterans.

Commander Elkin reminded us of the mid-winter encampment and asked for a show of hands of those planning to attend so appropriate plans could be made. Approximately 5-7 members plan to attend.

Commander Elkin asked Treasurer McNally how many members still had not paid their 2008 dues. Eight have not yet paid. (It is important to get membership finalized before filing form 27, our annual camp report, which is due by April 30. IF YOU HAVEN'T PAID YOUR DUES YET, SEND THEM TO TREASURER MCNALLY ASAP!)

New Business

Jon Ayers offered the November issue of the Civil War Courier, which Randy McNally accepted.

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Commander Elkin reminded us of the Lincoln Day Ceremony in April and the program on February 10 (2:00 p.m. CST/3:00 p.m. EST), the Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial Celebration.

Commander Elkin distributed copies of the proposed amendments to Article VII of our national Constitution concerning classes of membership. These will be voted on at the Department Encampment in June. (Copies included with these minutes)

Commander Elkin reported that he had received a call from John Martino, Director of the Kokomo Parks and Recreation Department stating that the building to house the cannon had been completed, requesting to know when and how we wanted the cannon moved, and offering help with a plaque. There was much discussion, including the following:

- Have a public dedication after the cannon is placed in the building and the display is complete.
- Concern was expressed about moving the cannon without damage to it or the building.
- Move the cannon while the ground is frozen.
- Have a Civil War battle scene painted on the doors behind the cannon, perhaps by local high school art students.
- Russ Kirchner offered the use of a truck and trailer to move the cannon.
- Have the Park Dept. move the cannon and place it in the building so if any damage occurs to the building it isn't our responsibility.
- The cannon will face the front window straight on due to the size and shape of the building.
- The safety attachment should be removed before the cannon is placed.
- When the cannon was in the museum at the Johanning Center, there was a plaque on a stand which was moved with the cannon to storage. Does anyone at the Parks Dept. know where the plaque is?
- Items included in the display should remain the property of our camp, with a document signed indicating this.
- There are two photographs with different women dressed in period costume standing by the cannon that could be included in the display.
- A plaque indicating that the mannequin is on loan would be appropriate.
- Donate the caisson to the city.
- The federal government actually retains ownership of such pieces of artillery.

Commander Elkin read a thank-you note from the North Central Indiana Blue Star Mothers acknowledging our contribution of \$50.00.

Todd Dwigans requested information about presentations to Eagle Scouts by our order in regards to an honor court that will be held in one week for a new Eagle Scout. Information will be obtained from our Eagle Scout Coordinator, Ned Baker.

Program

Commander Elkin gave an interesting presentation about sacrifice during war times, focusing on the Civil War, but offering statistics and details from other conflicts to put the Civil War in perspective. The unreliability of casualty statistics, especially from the South, was presented with ideas for further research.

Commander Elkin closed the meeting at 2:40 p.m., and the closing prayer was given by Chaplain Jacob Elkin. The next meeting will be February 16.

	Section 2. Associates. There shall be ene two classes of Associates.			
	(a) Associates are males at least fourteen (14) years of age who do not meet the qualifications stipulated in Article III of this Constitution and Section 5 200303 of the Articles of Incorporation as amended in 1998 but otherwise meet the requirements for membership established by the National Organization.			
	(b) Junior Associates are males less than fourteen (14) years of age who do not meet the qualifications stipulated in Article III of this Constitution and Section 200303 of the Articles of Incorporation as amended in 1998 but otherwise meet the requirements for membership established by the National Organization. The minimum age for Junior Associates shall be specified in the Regulations of the Order.			
	(c) The combined number of Associates and Junior Associates in any Camp shall not exceed one-third (1/3) of the total roster of the Camp at the time of election. At no time during a meeting of a Camp, a Department, or the National Organization shall business be transacted if the number of Associates in attendance exceeds forty-nine per cent (49%) of the total attendance then present at said meeting.			
	(d) Associates may not be elected, appointed, or otherwise assume the offices of Commander-in-Chief, Senior Vice Commander-in-Chief, Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief, National Secretary, National Treasurer or be appointed Commanding Officer of the Sons of Veterans Reserve.			
	(e) Associates and Junior Associates shall not be counted toward the required number of members to establish a new Camp. The names of Associates and Junior Associates may not appear on the Camp Charter nor may Associates or Junior Associates be designated as Charter Members of the Camp. Associates otherwise enjoy all the rights, privileges, and responsibilities of membership			
	Section 3. Establishment of Associates and Junior Associates by Departments and Camps. Departments, at their own discretion, may establish Associates and/or Junior Associates provided that no Department may establish Junior Associates without previously or concurrently establishing Associates. Departments may impose further restrictions on Associates and Junior Associates, provided that the rights established in Chapter V, Article VI of the National Regulations may not be altered, reduced, or vacated. If a Department specifically establishes Associates and/or Junior Associates by amending its By-Laws, Camps within said Department may amend the Camp By-Laws and establish Associates and/or Junior Associates provided that no Camp shall			
	establish Junior Associates without previously or concurrently establishing Associates. Camps may impose further restrictions in accordance with the provisions of the Department By-Laws and provided that the rights established in Chapter V, Article VI of the National Regulations may not be altered, reduced, or vacated. If a Department does not establish Associates and/or Junior Associates, Camps within the Department's jurisdiction may not establish Associates and/or Junior Associates.
